

McCain Vs. Obama



- Provide citizens with choices of different health insurance plans
- Encourage Personal Responsibility
- Tax credit to individuals and families to increase incentive to purchase health insurance
- No mandate for health insurance coverage
- No HIT component yet

- Universal coverage utilizing a mix of private and public modalities
- Quality, affordable and portable coverage for All
- Children required to have insurance, no mandate for adults
- Lower costs by modernizing the U.S. healthcare system
- Up to \$10B per year for HIT

Current HIT Legislation Environment

- No significant action during 110th Congress
- E-prescribing only success story
- Currently tracking over 100 separate pieces of HIT related legislation
- What to expect during final days of 2nd Session (2008)?
 - S. 1693 (Wired for Health Care Quality Act)
 - Has passed HELP Committee
 - Awaiting full Senate Action; No House Action on companion bill
 - H.R. 6357, PRO(TECH)T Act of 2008
 - H.R. 1467 (10,000 Trained by 2010)
 - Passed House
 - Viewed as education legislation by Senate HELP. No Action to date.

Federal Health Information Technology Policy Issues

- Reimbursement & Capital Costs
 - Aligning Financial Incentives
 - Driving Cost-Effectiveness (i.e. Chronic Care & Disease Mgmt)
 - Start-up Costs Capital Investment
 - Federal Investments (DoD; VHA; IHS; Appropriations for Contracts & Grants)
- Standards (Clinical & Communications)
 - Quality & Safety
- Infrastructure Issues
 - Network Infrastructure / Broadband Access / Interoperability (FCC; DoC)
- Human Dimension Issues
 - Arrangements to Practice in an e-enabled Environment
 - Practitioner and Patient Acceptance
 - Licensure, Accreditation, Certification
 - Legal (Stark Law, Liability, FDA, HIPAA & Ongoing Security Concerns)
 - Training an HIT Workforce (NSF; BHP)



States and HIT Activity

- As conveners, payers, providers, and regulators of healthcare, states are recognizing their role in using HIT to transform healthcare
- States are leveraging **publicly funded health programs** to drive the use of HIT
 - Medicaid
 - Public Health
 - State Employee Health Benefits Programs
- In 2008, **1,000+ pieces of legislation** introduced in 45 state legislatures addressing HIT
- In 2007, 250+ bills introduced in 38 state legislatures and the District of Columbia and 74 Bills passed and became law

 - SCHIP
 - Health Professions
 - Telecom Legislation
 - Pay for Performance
 - Farm Bill HR. 2419 Rural Grants CHCs





Sample Legislation 110th Congress

- Rep. David Wu (D-OR) (H.R. 1467)
- \$99.6 M to fund training of HIT Workers thru National Science Foundation
- Colleges, Universities, Voc Tech
- Undergraduate and Graduate Programs
- 10,000 workers by 2010
- Priority of AHIMA and AMIA
- Passed the Full House, June, 2007

Some Issues Going Into the 111th Congress

- Belief that all HIT legislation could be "held hostage" by privacy concerns
- Ongoing role of AHIC
- Coordination among federal agencies
- Ongoing meetings with key House and Senate health aides to assess situation for legislation movement
- Supporting efforts of GAO and Congressional Budget Office Costs ?
- Democrat and Republican Presidential Candidates' Platforms
 - HIT content in both!
- New educational sessions and field trips for congressional staff

Reauthorization Telecom ?

- S.101 "USA Act" (Telecom Amends)
- Creates Broadband Program
- Revisits definition of Rural
- Expands list of eligible entities:
 - Not-for profit nursing homes and SNF
 - Critical Access Hospitals
 - EMS Facilities
 - Hospice providers; rural dialysis; Tribal Health Clinics
 - Not-for-profit Dental Clinics; School Health Clinics; Residential Treatment Facilities; Rural Pharmacies;
 - Consortia of Any of the Above
 - Others the Commission May Deem Eligible
