Changes due to Recent Developments

Federation Operating Practices and Policies

- Last change made was 2018.
- That current version of the <u>FOPP is here</u>.

Dept of Ed: Eliminated Regional and National distinctions

- In February of 2020, the Department of Education <u>eliminated the distinction</u> <u>between regional and national accrediting agencies</u>.
- This created one unified set of "institutional accreditors."

For further background, the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (NASFAA) released a <u>news and opinion piece about this change</u>.

Impact for InCommon

- We define the eligibility criteria for Higher Education Institutions to join InCommon in the Federation's policy document called the FOPP
- In the FOPP (§ <u>4.1.1.</u>)—and on our <u>website</u>—we distinguish these Regional and National accreditation bodies.
- The InCommon Steering Committee governs all changes to this policy document and must vote to approve all updates

Proposed change to the FOPP: Redline

4.1.1 Eligibility to become a participant

InCommon currently has three classes of Participants:

- (1) Higher Education (accredited post-secondary institutions and their central offices). To qualify as a Higher Education participant, an organization must be:
- A postsecondary two- or four year degree granting institution or program that is- accredited by an institutional accreditor recognized by agency on the U.S. Department of Education's list of recognized regional accrediting agencies as listed on the InCommon website (URL found in section 2.4); or
- •A state higher education system office or another central coordinating office which either governs or manages a collection of accredited; degree-granting institutions. The entity must be commissioned, established, or recognized by a local, state, or national government to perform this activity or must be a cooperative venture organized by and for the benefit of higher education institutions for the above purposes. Documentation substantiating these criteria may be required, and determinations will be made on a case by case basis.

FOPP Housekeeping: Three other changes proposed

- Our street address changed in Ann Arbor
- 2. InCommon ended the "Assurance" program in favor of Baseline Expectations back in May of 2021. <u>Steering Minutes here</u>.
- The last section of the FOPP mentions a "risk assessment paper"
 - Originally an Appendix in the FOPP from 2004
 - Moved into its own paper as risks became more well understood
 - Eventually not migrated to new InCommon.org website
 - Forever thankful to the Nation Magazine for donating to us our domain: incommon.org!



Eligibility as an InCommon Higher Education participant

A Higher Education Institution is defined in InCommon policy as a U.S. two- or four-year institution accredited by one of the following agencies. Also, some systems and central coordinating offices/organizations are also eligible to join under this classification. See section 4.1 of the FOPP, and send us a note us to discuss.

These regional accreditation agencies are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education.

National institutional and specialized accrediting bodies
